### JOB OPPORTUNITIES

**University of Sydney Indonesian Studies Casual Staff Register:** The Department of Indonesian Studies at the University of Sydney is in the process of establishing a casual staff register. Expressions of interest from suitably qualified people are welcome. Successful applicants will be eligible for consideration for occasional guest lecturing and sessional tutoring in the Indonesian language program. All applicants must have native or near-native fluency in Indonesian, have spent considerable time in Indonesia, and have a tertiary qualification (in any discipline). Tertiary teaching experience and language teaching qualifications are desirable but not essential. Successful applicants will have good organisational skills, be able to work independently under the direction of a supervisor and have the potential to establish good rapport with tertiary students. Applicants should submit their full contact details; a brief CV highlighting relevant skills, qualifications and experience; the name and contact details of one academic referee; and a one-page statement of their approach to teaching (written in Indonesian) to Dr Michele Ford (Michele.Ford@arts.usyd.edu.au) by **6 February 2006**.
