The sudden demise of the Suharto administration in 1998 ended 32 years of political oppression in Indonesia and initiated a period of significant political liberalisation, restructuring and reform (Ind.: *Reformasi*). Nearly ten years have passed and we are frequently reminded that many difficulties remain. This year's Annual Indonesia Lecture Series, however, brings together a panel of international experts to address the equally important task of reflecting on what has changed and what has been achieved during the terms of Indonesia's four post-Suharto presidents and throughout this period of democratisation in general. Presentations will be followed by an extended public debate with members of the audience, many of whom will be experts on Indonesia attending the ASAA *Indonesia Council Open Conference* (24-25th Sept) at Monash University.
